About GPV/KCV

In April 2001, Grandparents Victoria (GPV) was formed as an organization based on the belief that grandparents can play a valuable role in supporting and advocating for families and the wider community and promoting the value of the public sector. At this early stage, with only four members at the first meeting, it was not clear what action the group would take, or how its activities were to be funded, but enthusiasm was high.

For the first two years, GPV focused on consultation with grandparents to learn what challenges they and their families were facing. A series of forums were also held across Victoria to collect different many opinions. Since then, regular forums and surveys have been conducted to verify these early views.

In March 2002, the issues faced by grandparents raising their grandchildren were noted, with the GPV Board deciding that the role of grandparents within child protection would be a priority area of work.

Another landmark was reached in 2004 when GPV staff attended its first local grandparents support group. This was the first of many visits to support groups across the state. In 2010 the Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) awarded GPV the contract to establish Kinship Carers Victoria (KCV) as the peak group representing the views of kinship carers.

GPV/KCV addresses a wide range of issues. Some issues, aside from support for kinship carers, appear on its work program year in and year out, with family poverty being the most urgent of all the issues addressed over the years.

- GPV/KCV is committed to an ethical approach to its work, undertaking to:

 maintain a commitment to its beliefs and aims, prioritising the wellbeing of families
 - maintain confidentiality, protecting the privacy of all who associate with GPV/KCV
 - uphold individual rights and advocate for the rights of disadvantaged groups
 - poster a culture of fairness

GPV/KCV believes that:

- all children must be protected and given every opportunity and support to fulfil their potential
- the needs of families are becoming more complex and the support grandparents can offer to families in general is significant
- grandparents and kinship carers have unique understandings and attitudes that should influence decisions about child wellbeing
- grandparents and kinship carers have a responsibility to engage in public discussions and to act to ensure the wellbeing of children

No personal information is ever shared with any other agency, including DFFH or any other government agency. When survey reports are completed the personal data of participants is destroyed.






These issues are emerging issues likely to be subject of intense discussion and action in forthcoming years.

Support and Advice Service

KCV provides a Support and Advice Service to kinship carers. Some issues raised through this service are referred to the GPV/KCV Board, other issues are discussed with DFFH and agencies.

The chart below demonstrates the number of contacts made with the service across 7 years. The increase in 20-21 was caused by COVID. In this year, we had many calls from carers and we employed extra staff to keep in contact with them, offering reassurance and advice about government assistance.




Issues raised by carers



The reason behind the contacts remains constant across the four years from 2020 to 2024 years.






Websites updates and visits

The substantial growth in the access to resources posted on the KCV website reflects the effort expended by KCV in developing resources for carers. There was a growth of 26088 visits to the website in 24-25 FY.

The contacts made via the Support and Advice Service are regularly analysed to reveal topical and emerging issue about which carers might need additional information. Resources are developed according to the outcome of the analysis.




Written resources

- Cyber safety for children and young people



- Loneliness




Video views

Production of videos is a relatively recent innovation. This is an area of work that KCV would like to expand. However, budget restrictions do not allow this. In this financial year, GPV/KCV published the positive discipline video.



The most popular video in this financial year was the one related to positive discipline. It was aligned to our campaign to abolish corporal punishment and to have it outlawed in Australia.



Development of Resources is now the major part of support and advice service

The development of resources in response to carers areas of need and interest has increased substantially in the last few years.


As well as reflecting the needs of carers, these resources has been developed with the two original kinship care manuals in mind.

The information in the manuals is covered across the new KCV resources with information such as telephone numbers regularly updated.

Podcast listens

The number of carers listening to podcasts is steadily increasing with some podcasts developed a number of years ago still attracting an audience. The slight decrease in listeners in 24-25 FY is caused by the fact that there were fewer podcasts produced in 24-25 FY.


Video views

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The number of written resources distributed directly to callers has risen. This is partly due to the fact that there are more resources available and that they are more finely tune to the needs of carers.








Types and Locations of Seminars Conducted in 24-25 FY


Nutrition seminars were held in Dandenong, Melton, Wonthaggi, Kensington, Geelong, Warragul, and Epping with 76 carers attending. Understanding the OOHC system seminars were held in Frankston, Geelong, and Reservoir with 39 carers attending.

The carers attending the seminars withdrawn from three broad geographical locations.



Growth in carers' knowledge and confidence


Both the carers' knowledge and confidence grew substantially at each seminar and across all of them.



KCV follow up of carers after the seminars

After March 2025, participants attending KCV seminars were asked to nominate one or two actions they plan to take, or a shift attitude held by them, that have arisen from their participation in the seminar. Over time, the carers were contacted and asked how these commitments to change were maintained and what their lingering thoughts might be.

82 carers were followed up and asked whether or not they had implemented the follow up action. The number of carers contacted for follow up are in the graph below and majority has taken some follow up action.



Kinship Care Week Activities



The KCW 24-25 activities included:

- 7 activities organised and attended by KCV staff/ Board
- 6 communiques
- 2 award dinners
- 1 widespread mailout of 5 resource books
- 1 video of Minister posted on website and emailed to homes
- 1 launch of 5 resource books on website



Representation and Advocacy

Campaigns

In every year since 2002, GPV/KCV has conducted campaigns, despite the anticipation of slow, or even no, progress. However, the nexus between the campaign issues and the life chances of children is so tight, GPV/KCV is compelled to battle on.

Over the years many new campaigns have been taken up. Some campaigns are ongoing. Take, for example, calling for early support for vulnerable families, the reunification of children with parents, and banning adoption as an option within child protection measures are all continuing.

The GPV/KCV campaign program relies on donations with the membership fees of Life Members of GPV/KCV were critical in setting up the program in the early 2000s.

The campaigns activated in 24-25 FY were:



Abolishing Adoption in Child Protection

To ensure that adoption is not allowed as an option with child protection procedures and is better regulated to protect all parties' rights.



Abolishing Corporal Punishment

To ensure that the Australian Government makes corporal punishment of children and young people illegal across Australia.



Abolishing Female Genital Mutilation

To ensure the abolition of female genital mutilation across Australia.



Improving Education for children and young people

To ensure improvements in provision of education services to all children and young people.



Resisting the Vic. Children, Youth and Families Act

To ensure that the Act is changed to remove clauses unfavourable to children brought into force in 2016.



Supporting Kinship Carers

To amplify the voices of kinship care families and improve the visibility of kinship carers.

Auditor's Report

Independent Auditors Report to the members of the Association

We have audited the accompanying financial report, being a special purpose financial report, of Grandparents Victoria Inc. (the association), which comprises the committee's report, the assets and liabilities statement as at 30 June 2025, the income and expenditure statement for the year then ended, cash flow statement, notes comprising a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information, and the certification by members of the committee on the annual statements giving a true and fair view of the financial position and performance of the association.

Committee's Responsibility for the Financial Report

The committee of Grandparents Victoria Inc. is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial report, and has determined that the basis of preparation described in Note 1 is appropriate to meet the requirements of the *Corporations Act 2001/ACNC Act* and is appropriate to meet the needs of the members. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by the committee, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial report.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Opinion

In our opinion, the financial report presents fairly, in all material respects (or gives a true and fair view – refer to the applicable state/territory Act), the financial position of Grandparents Victoria Inc. as at 30 June 2025 and (of) its financial performance for the year then ended in accordance with the accounting policies described in Note 1 to the financial statements, and the requirements of the *Corporations Act* 2001/ACNC Act.
